Dear Parents,

I trust that you have all had a restful weekend Many of you have been asking about AI writing tools such as ChatGTP and what the this means for education today and the future. I have used an AI writing tool for a parent guide to keep you informed: As AI writing tools become more prevalent, it is important you to be aware of their potential benefits and drawbacks.

- 1.AI writing tools can be helpful for students who struggle with writing. AI writing tools, like grammar checkers and essay generators, can be particularly helpful for students who struggle with writing. These tools can provide feedback on grammar and syntax, suggest improvements to sentence structure, and even generate whole paragraphs or essays based on a given prompt. However, parents should encourage their children to use these tools as a supplement to their own writing, rather than a replacement for it.

3.Al writing tools can be a form of plagiarism. Some Al writing tools, particularly those that generate whole paragraphs or essays, can be a form of plagiarism if not used properly. Parents should emphasise the importance of creating original work and discourage their children from relying too heavily on these tools.









4. Al writing tools can be expensive. While some Al writing tools are free, many require a subscription or purchase. Parents should research the various options and prices before deciding which tool to use.






CIS University Exploration Day

Dress Code Reminder

Every morning as your children enter school we monitor their uniform to ensure that they are in keeping with our TBS Dress Code. Thank you for your support with keeping jewellery at home and for taking note in regards to facial piercing.

EYFS

EYFS article for Newsletter – Part 3

Carrying on from our previous Newsletter, The EYFS Team will continue to explain the "Three Characteristics of Effective Teaching and Learning" part 3.

We are all aware that children have great minds and to enhance this, we can help them become even more powerful learners through the following three characteristics:

- Part 1 playing and exploring I investigate and experience things, and 'have a go'.
- Part 2 active learning I concentrate and keep on trying even when I encounter difficulties. I enjoy achieving.
- Part 3 creating and thinking critically I am learning to develop my own ideas, make links between ideas, and develop strategies for doing things.



In this week's Newsletter, we will continue with Part 3, "Creating and Thinking Critically" put in simple point form:

- I take part in simple pretend play, e.g. I might use an object like a brush to pretend to brush my hair, or 'drink' from a pretend cup.
- I can sort materials, e.g. at tidy-up time, I know how to put different construction materials in separate baskets.
- I can talk about my learning. I think about my progress as I try to achieve a goal. I check how well I am doing.
- I am learning to solve real problems, e.g. to share nine strawberries between three friends, a strategy I might use is to put one in front of each, then a second, then a third. Finally, I might check at the end that everyone has the same number of strawberries.











Music - Progress in Violin Learning

We are proud to report excellent progress being made by our Key Stage Two students in their violin learning. The hard work and dedication of both students and teachers have led to some striking developments in their skills.

Originally, our plan was that by the end of this term, students would be using their second finger, but we are delighted to announce that in some classes, we are already progressing to using the third finger. This advancement opens up a much broader repertoire of music and hopefully, by the end of the year, students will be able to give some excellent performances.

Some parents have already received audio recordings of their children performing as a class, showcasing the progress made by each student. We hope that as students continue to show progress, we will be able to share more and more of these exciting developments.

The dedication and hard work of both students and teachers have paid off, and we are incredibly proud of the progress being made in our Key Stage Two violin learning program. Keep up the excellent work, and we look forward to seeing the many more outstanding performances in the future.

Dear parents and students,

We had a relatively smooth transition to our Ramadan Timetable with our students and staff quickly adapting to the changes. Staff have planned their lessons to make the most of the shorter lesson time and will keep to the planned schedules of their Long Term Plans. As you know we have many external exams in May and June and need all the time we can get to prepare students to perform to the best of their abilities. Good performances come from those who prefer the best – the luckiest students in exams also appear to be the best prepared!

At the beginning of last week, we completed our twelve days of Mock Examinations, although we will continue with our Arabic exams from Thursday 6 April until Wednesday 12 April. 
English Department
