During 2021-2022 GEMS TBS welcomed the Council of International Schools (CIS) to visit us virtually as part of our international accreditation. The evaluators from CIS were impressed with our school and have provided much valuable feedback for us to advance to the next stage in the accreditation process: the school self-study.

Part of this self-study is a Community Survey which involves all stakeholders of the school. At GEMS TBS we want you to experience excellence, and we know this means continuously evaluating what we do. In addition to our GEMS Parent Satisfaction Survey, the CIS Community Survey will help us better understand how we are doing as a school in different areas and from all stakeholders. The more parents, students, teachers and support staff we hear from, the more confident we can be in our development plan.



TBS Students Take Part in the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) Junior Challenge

The United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) was founded in 1996 with the aim of advancing the education of young people. The UKMT Individual Mathematics Challenges are intriguing multiple-choice question papers designed to stimulate interest in mathematics. The Junior Challenge attracts over 300 000 entries each year and is the United Kingdom's most popular mathematics competition. The competition is also open to international schools that offer a properly accredited British education.




The papers contain 25 multiple choice questions. Of these, the first 15 are more accessible whilst the final 10 provide more food for thought. Gold, silver or bronze certificates are awarded to only 40% of participants.

This year the Junior Challenge was sat at TBS, and a number of TBS students were selected to take part. Some of those students had been preparing since the beginning of the year through the Mathematical Challenge After School Activity.

English Department

Top Tips for Studying Science Summarized from www.greatschools.org

It's exam season!

Studying for science is very different than studying for history or English. Strategies that work for those classes may not work well in a science class. You probably won't have time to try all of these strategies, but pick a few you think will help and try those. The key is to find as many different ways to work with the information and use as many of your senses (visual, auditory and tactile) as you can to help you retain the information.

1. Schedule study time

Use a study planner to organize your study times.

2. Take breaks

After 45 minutes of studying, take a 10 minute break to refresh you brain/body.

3. Read the detail, but read for meaning.

Writing summaries in your own words will improve your understanding of the concept.

4. Flashcards

Use flashcards to learn terminology.

5. Use drawings and diagrams

Employ imagery such as drawings, diagrams, and mind maps to make the most challenging processes easy to remember.

6. Use mnemonic devices

Remember, MRS. GREN @ It works because it is effective.

7. Teach it!

The reasons teachers are experts in their courses is because they teach it regularly! Teach a topic to your fellow friends and you will understand the topic better.

8. Start a study group

Practice your explanations on people studying the same material, ask and answer questions, and share study tips together.

If you struggle with test anxiety, seek the support of your teachers and school pastoral team.

- Basic information about the book: such as title, author and genre

Primary and secondary students were excited to share their reads, submissions are currently being collected, and final House scores will be announced soon.

Dress Code Reminder
