My father worked in the family carpentry business as an apprentice and studied to become a Master Joiner ultimately opening his own business. From my first day at school, all I had ever wanted to do was become a teacher. In Scotland, higher education was at that time, and still is, very pro-active in ensuring that university and college was accessible to all. There were no fees for courses and for those families who needed, there were grants awarded to cover cost of living and transportation as well as accommodation. All I needed were the grades at Higher Level and I would be accepted, I had never considered that I was breaking the mould and achieving what my parents were not able to do. It was not easy as I juggled two jobs in a Golf Club and in a Rugby Club in addition to my studies and teaching practices yet I achieved my goal. The pride on my parents faces when I graduated was worth it. The need to provide education opportunities to everyone is, therefore, very close to my heart. Your ability to succeed in life should not be limited by your family circumstances. I wonder what your journey story is?

Colours of Spring around New Cairo

Have you notice the Flamboyant Trees in bloom? They are all across the city and their other name of Flame Tree reflects the brilliant orange flowers. Some are so heavily laden with flowers you cannot see the branches or leaves! Another tree that is common around Rehab and beyond is the Silk Floss Tree, there are some on the roundabouts at the Soukh and Mall 1 beside school. This deciduous tree native to the subtropical forests of South America has hidden secrets. On the trunk are spikes or bumps full of a material similar to cotton which can be used for stuffing. The bark can be used to make ropes, the wood has traditionally been used to make canoes and the seeds can produce oil for cooking and industrial use. The leaves are beginning to show on our Silk Floss Trees and the most wonderful pink flowers will follow soon.

Dress Code Reminder

Every morning as your children enter school we monitor their uniform to ensure that they are in keeping with our TBS Dress Code. Thank you for your support with keeping jewellery at home and for taking note in regards to facial piercing.
