Focus on Primary

EYFS-Transitions to the next year group

As we come to the end of the school year, many of us are focussing on the summer holidays and plans for travel and family time which are very important. The final EY Parent Workshop on 6th June will be about Summer activities for children. We hope you can attend.

However, before we finish the term, the teachers are also thinking about next year and how to prepare the children for the change of class, year group and teacher. For Preschool students and FSI students, the transition is minimal. They are already familiar with the EY department and know all of the teachers already. However, we do recognise that they will be moving to a different classroom, classes are mixed up and some teachers will be new to TBS. So please talk to your children about this in a positive way over the holidays.

For FS2, the change is bigger as they will be moving out of the EY department and going to Year 1. So, we have planned a few visits for them to go and spend time in each of the Year 1 classrooms, do activities, play games, ask questions and find out more about the teachers etc.

If your child comes home and tells you they know which class they are in, with a specific teacher, please remind them this is not decided yet and they will be visiting all classes. The biggest change in Year I can be independence. In FS2 we encourage the children to unpack their bags, eat lunch sensibly, walk in the corridors etc but we are aware that some still need support with this.

Over the holidays, please allow your children to be independent with dressing/undressing, toileting, carrying their own things in a bag that they have packed themselves, eating independently (including opening packets) and looking after their own belongings.

What can parents and carers do?

- Talk positively about the move to year 1 and play down your own anxieties if you have them. For example, instead of saying things like, 'You'll have to work a lot harder in year 1', say, 'It will be exciting to learn about new things, won't it?'
- Talk about what is coming up in September. The summer holiday is a longer one, so it helps to keep the changes fresh in your child's mind. Talk about their new teacher and what they are looking forward to in year 1.
- Read, read, read. Reading with and to your child is the single most powerful thing you can do to support their learning and progress at school.
- Encourage your child to write, but make it fun and meaningful. For example, writing a shopping list for a meal they have chosen, writing a holiday diary or sending an email to Granny and Grandad.
- Practise telling the time to the hour and half hour on a clock with hands.









- Practise counting in 2s, 5s and 10s, talk about 'more than' and 'less than' and look for 2D and 3D shapes in the world around you.
- Practise handwriting and letter formation. If your child has a weak grip or struggles to hold a pencil, strengthen their fingers using activities such as playdough, bead threading, construction with bricks.
- If your child will be wearing shoes with laces, please teach them how to tie them by themselves.

TBS Medical Update: Summer is here how can We stay healthy

While winter is the season of illness Summer also has its challenges, to prevent ourselves from being sick in the summer and enjoy it we need to know the most common summer illnesses.

- Heat exhaustion/ Heat stroke and dehydration: Always wear loosely fitted cotton clothes and keep hydrated. During physical activity drink 2 to 3 cups of water every hour.
- Sunburn: It happens When your skin is exposed to too much sun avoid sun exposure from and use sunscreen
- Heat rash/ Sweat rash: It is due to blockage and inflammation of sweat ducts causing small red spots which are irritating and itchy. Always wear loose cotton clothes and take cool baths and shower and stay hydrated.
- Conjunctivitis (Pink eye): Bacterial growth is more in the summer heat leading to eye infection and it is also communicable and can spread to others. To prevent it always wash your hands and avoid touching your eyes, don't share towels o cosmetics and change pillowcases often.
- Food poisoning: Bacteria grow faster in the summer, eating food left out for too long can make people sick. Keep raw meat, Poultry and seafood chilled below 4 degrees Celsius until ready to cook, wash your hands before cooking and eating, Wash fruits and vegetables properly and keep food closed in containers until consumption.
- Eczema: It is a common skin disease and increased by sweating causing severe itching
- Nosebleed: Nose bleeds are frequent problems in hot weather as the small blood vessels in noses dilate and burst. It is prevalent in small children.

So, Enjoy the summer and the outdoors but stay hydrated!!!!

Dress Code Reminder

Every morning as your children enter school we monitor their uniform to ensure that they are in keeping with our TBS Dress Code. Thank you for your support with keeping jewellery at home and for taking note in regards to facial piercing.
