Dear TBS Family,

I want to share with you another of my favourite places to visit when I am home in Scotland.

Further down the Clyde coast from Helensburgh. Portencross is one of those places that feels like stepping into another time. The tiny harbour and sweeping views across the Firth of Clyde give it a guiet magic, but it's the history that makes it truly special. At its heart stands Portencross Castle, a 14th-century stronghold linked to the Stewart kings of Scotland, with legends suggesting that ships carrying the bodies of Scottish monarchs once sailed from here to Iona. In later years, Portencross became part of the great "doon the watter" tradition, when paddle steamers carried Glaswegian families down the Clyde in search of sea breezes and adventure. Even today, the Waverley can sometimes be spotted passing by, a living link to those golden holiday days. Whether you are drawn by the history, the coastal walks, or the unforgettable sunsets behind Arran, Portencross is a place where Scotland's past and present meet in the most beautiful way. The castle is being partly restored by some dedicated volunteers and funds from Historic Scotland.

Y11/12 CAST 2nd Cycle Launches with Unique Industry Collaborations

The second cycle of the Y11/12 CAST program kicked off with exciting opportunities in collaboration with the Egypt Space Agency. Students gained exclusive access to a high-security facility where they viewed real satellite prototypes and cutting-edge aerospace tools, thanks to support from Trace EdTech. This experience offered valuable insights into aerospace engineering and related career pathways.

Meanwhile, another group engaged in a dynamic design thinking workshop at the Universities of Canada in Egypt's School of Business. Through inquiry-based learning and problem-solving exercises, students began laying the groundwork for their upcoming Game Design and Mobile Robot Cleaner projects.

Mobile Phones in Schools - We Want Your Views

Across the world, many countries are reviewing the use of mobile phones in schools, with several introducing partial or complete bans. France, Italy, the Netherlands, Hungary, Greece, Finland, Brazil, South Korea (from 2026), and others have already acted, while the UAE Ministry of Education recently prohibited students from bringing phones to public schools, with strict rules for confiscation if phones are found.

The reasons are similar everywhere: reducing distractions in lessons, improving focus, supporting student wellbeing, and limiting the pressures of constant screen and social media use. At the same time, some parents and students value phones for communication and safety, particularly on journeys to and from school.

As a school, we are now reflecting on this important issue and would like to hear your views. Should we consider restricting or banning mobile phones in school? 














Year 6






MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF MATHS

Welcome back to a new academic year! Our department's mission is clear: to ensure that every student achieves beyond international benchmarks through engaging, rigorous, and supportive mathematics learning. This year, we are aligning tightly with the School Improvement Plan (SIP) by focusing on attainment, progress, teaching quality, and student well-being.

Key Priorities for 2025-26

- Raising Attainment:
- Building on last year's successes in Year 7 (+6.8 progress in Maths), we aim to replicate this growth across all year groups. Year 8 has been identified as a priority cohort following DIPs in fluency and reasoning.
- Assessment for Learning (AfL):
- Weekly planners, consistent use of RAG-challenge feedback, and differentiated homework will support visible progress in every lesson.
- Student Agency & Engagement:
- From cross-curricular STEAM projects to real-world problem-solving (e.g., "Why do bikes have gears?" in Year 8), our learners will connect Maths to meaningful contexts.
- Fluency & Problem Solving:
- Daily fluency drills (number bonds, times tables) combined with open-ended reasoning tasks will ensure depth as well as speed.

What We're Teaching This Term

- Year 7: Building strong foundations in number, rounding, and factors.
- Year 8: Powers of 10, Rounding, Factors & Multiples, Estimation, and early Algebra.
- Year 9: Statistics, transformations, and algebraic reasoning.
- Year 10 (IGCSE): Focus on algebraic techniques, percentages, and circle theorems.

Each year group will complete Baseline Assessments this month, with feedback shared to parents in the first progress report.

Celebrating Success

- Congratulations to Year 7 for their outstanding start, with 21 students already achieving "much higher than expected progress" in Maths.
- Special recognition to students who supported peers in lessons, modelling resilience and kindness.

Rewards will be consistently applied across the school: weekly positive points, half-term certificates, and end-of-year academic awards.

How Parents Can Support at Home

- Encourage daily practice of mental arithmetic and times tables.
- Discuss "real life maths" at home—percentages while shopping, measurements in cooking, or graphs in the news.
- Ensure homework is completed weekly (set on Phoenix, due the following week).

Looking Ahead

This year, our Maths Department will:

- Host an Innovation Fair with a cross-curricular STEAM showcase.
- Launch weekly fluency challenges with inter-class competitions.
- Host parent workshops on supporting mathematical reasoning at home.

Final Word: Mathematics is more than numbers—it's problem-solving, logical thinking, and resilience. Together—teachers, students, and parents—we will ensure that every learner not only meets but exceeds expectations.

Trust in School Decisions re classes: We would like to emphasise the importance of trust in the decisions made by our experienced and dedicated teaching staff. Classes are carefully crafted to provide balance by our qualified and experienced teachers and Heads of School, and any decisions they make to shuffle classes and allocate teachers are done with the best interests of our students in mind. It is essential to note that we will not accept requests from parents regarding their son/daughter's assigned class. Our primary goal is to create an optimal learning environment for every student, and we appreciate your support and trust in this matter.

A gentle reminder about GEMS TBS expectations which are part of the School-Parent Agreement:

Appearance:

We believe that a neat and well-groomed appearance is not only a reflection of personal pride but also essential for fostering a readiness to learn. Please note that all girls and boys with longer hair are required to have their hair tied back at all times. No extreme or fashion hairstyles are permitted. This includes hair shaving for boys and braids and coloured hair for both girls and boys.

No jewelry or accessories are permitted, including piercings other than studs in ears, and will be ask to be removed if worn. Neither make-up nor nail polish is allowed and students with either will be asked to remove it. Smart watches are not permitted in school.

School Uniform Policy:

Our uniform not only promotes a sense of unity but also minimises distraction, allowing students to focus on their studies. Please, ensure that your child adheres to our school's uniform policy. Only items that are part of our school uniform are allowed within the school campus except on specified dress up days. Children will be asked to remove non-uniform items of clothing before entering school and if this is not possible, you will receive a call asking for you to bring the correct uniform. Please note that this includes shoes – trainers are to be worn only on allocated PE days.













Attendance


