COP27 begins today with representatives from the 198 countries who have signed the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change coming to Egypt to discuss climate action updates from COP26 in Glasgow last year. Five key areas that are set to be discussed are nature, food, water, industry decarbonisation and climate adaptation. We are honoured that some of our Secondary Students are taking part in youth events directly related to COP27 and are actively involved in committing to solutions for the next generation. This week 10 of our Year 9 and 10 students will be participation in a day event hosted by El Allson School focusing on the impact of climate change since the 2015 COP21 when The Paris Agreement was signed as a legally binding international treaty on climate change. Our young people are the future and our TBS Future Leaders are acting as role models not only to the rest of our student body but to the country as a whole.

Attendance Policy Updates

Thank you to everyone in supporting TBS in prioritising the need for all students to be On Time In School everyday. To continue to focus on this we have updated our Attendance Policy which you can read in full here.

We have already reported the impact of arriving late to school has on an individual's learning. We are now focusing on the impact on the students who arrive on time for registration yet their learning is disrupted by a student arriving late.

To minimise this impact I would like to draw you attention to one section in the Late Arrival part of our policy:

• If a student arrives after 07:55am they may be required to wait until the next lesson change before attending a class to avoid the disruption of others' learning.

Please note that this will come into effect as from Sunday, 13th November and will impact on all students from Year 7-12.

We ask for your support to ensure that all students are OTIS (On Time In School) everyday.

PASS Survey

GL's Pupil Attitude to Self and School (PASS) is a tool that supports students' wellbeing in learning and offers practical next steps. Social and emotional wellbeing is essential for effective learning, yet there will always be students who lack the confidence in their learning and who do not always feel connected with school and their teachers. PASS surveys focus on three broad areas – how a student feels about themselves, their engagement with the curriculum, and their feelings about school.

At TBS we use the data from the PASS survey to triangulate with other GL standardised assessments (CAT4 and Progress Tests) to build an individual profile for each student an ensure that we are supporting them through academic or pastoral interventions where required.

Over the coming weeks, all students from Year 3 to 12 will be taking the 20 minute online survey in one of our IT labs.

Hosting Cambridge Teacher Professional Training

On Friday, 9th and Saturday 10th December TBS will be hosting teachers from Cairo for Professional Training for IGCSE Combined Science, IGCSE ICT, IGCSE Arabic, AS and AL Physics. Our TBS teachers will be attending to ensure they have the best knowledge to deliver the updated curriculum.



Voices of TBS

As you can imagine we have many phone calls throughout the day coming through to different departments. We have been updating our system to allow easier access and have used our Senior Students as the Voices of TBS both in English and in Arabic. So when you call

us, listening carefully to the voices you hear.

The importance of reading in EYFS

"When learners are between the age of three to seven, they expand out beyond verbal communication and start to develop written language skills as well."

Early reading ignites creativity, sparks curiosity, and stimulates the imagination in young children. Often, this leads to role-play as learners grow which helps to develop other skills such as empathy, problem-solving, and morality. Reading is essential and serves as a basic building block for learning. Reading with your child at a young age will help your child get to know sounds, words and language. Whilst reading with your child speak about the importance of books and the values of caring for books.

Take the time to read with your child daily, just 10 minutes whether it be your child reads to you or they listen to you read them a story. Add conversation to your story, ask your child questions to ensure that they understand what they are reading or listening to. Explain to your child the importance of reading and how we should take care of books.

Are You a Wimpy Parent?

1. Is your child the centre of your world?

If you answered 'yes' to this question then keep reading and consider the following...Your children's needs and wants must be balanced with your priorities. Child-centred families produce egotistical children who have a hard time dealing with the real world where compromise and cooperation are crucial.

2.Do you set clear rules?

Even if you answered 'yes' to this question, read on...Wimpy parents are insecure, indecisive and hesitant to set any rules. Once they make a decision, they are too willing to change their mind in response to their child's pleading or whining.



3. Are you overly concerned with your child's feelings?

If you answered 'yes' read on...wimpy parents are under the mistaken belief that their child's feelings are of the utmost importance. They will go to extraordinary efforts to make certain that their child feels comfortable and happy. Your child needs to learn to deal with feelings of sadness, anger, disappointment and frustration. Use naturally occurring events to teach your child about emotional resilience: the ability to 'bounce back' from life's inevitable tough times.

4.Do you enforce consequences?

Often the answer is 'yes...and no' so read on...rules without consequences are simply wishes. Wimpy parents are great at making excuses for their child's misbehaviour. Perhaps their child is hungry, tires, sad or (my favourite) 'under a lot of stress'. These are simply pseudo-explanations for bad behaviour. Here is another way to think about this: your child misbehaves because you allow it. Be consistent with your consequences for two weeks and you will be amazed at the difference in your child's behaviour.

5. Are you overly concerned with the options of others?

Hopefully you have answered 'no' to this one. Wimpy parents depend too much on the opinion of others. They seek advice from friends, relatives and experts to determine the best way to handle a situation (putting the responsibility on others). It can be very helpful to get different perspectives on an issue but most parents do very well relying on their knowledge of their child, combined with their family values and parenting style.
