# Why Maslow before Bloom Is Important

When we talk about Maslow before Bloom, we are referring to psychologists Abraham Maslow and Benjamin Bloom. Both professionals are noted for their behaviour and learning theories that continue to impact the way teachers plan and teach.

Maslow is best known for his creating a hierarchy of needs, a theory of psychological health predicated on fulfilling innate human needs in priority. From physiological survival needs on the base of the pyramid, we move through three more layers before reaching the top, to what he calls 'self-actualisation' — the ability to be creative, be problem solvers, be authentic and be spontaneous.

Bloom was amongst the first researchers who challenged that children could improve their learning skills when they were asked to answer more critical questions. Bloom proposed that we all follow a pattern of levels when it comes to the complexity of thought which cannot be learnt though books but through practical application. He created a list of these levels of thought known as Bloom's Taxonomy which even 70 years on are still the cornerstone of teaching and learning through scaffolding objectives and questioning.

Bloom's Taxonomy can be divided into two sections: lower and higher order thinking skills. It is these higher order thinking skills of analysing, evaluating and creating that link back to Malsow's work as they are the very top of his pyramid. This is why educators have a duty ensure that our students' basic human needs are supported to ensure that those high order thinking skills, or critical thinking skills, that are so essential for learning today can be developed.

Today we are seeing in our classrooms the ongoing impact of COVID lockdowns not only in gaps in knowledge and understanding but also in terms of our students' social skills and self-esteem. We have many ways to gather data on academic progress and attainment but we now need to make sure that we have effective tools to do the same for their pastoral needs so triangulation of data can happen to give a holistic picture for every student. This means even greater collaboration between our academic and pastoral teams at TBS looking for patterns and creating opportunities for all students' needs be met.
